


OPERATION LEPANTO

MONTHLY DEVOTION: THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

O God, who for our sake didst will Thy Son to undergo the torments of the Cross, that Thou mightest drive far from us the power of the enemy; grant unto us Thy servants that we may attain to the grace of His Resurrection. Through the same

Christ our Lord. Amen.

An indulgence of 5 years.

A plenary indulgence once a month on the usual conditions for the daily recitation of this prayer.



To receive Holy Communion:

- You must be a baptized Catholic, having made a good confession since the last committed mortal sin, if any, in order to hopefully be in the state of Grace.
- You must believe in the doctrine of Transubstantiation. "For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself" (1 Cor. 11:29).
- You must observe one hour of Eucharistic fast (except water and medicine. However, we advise to abstain from food and alcohol for three hours and one hour for other liquid before Holy Communion).
- One must not be a public sinner (public adulterer, concubine, public homosexual), or excommunicated, or interdicted.

The most important requirement is to have a great desire to receive the Body, the Blood, the Soul and the Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ.

- You can humbly approach the Communion rail at any time after the Communion of the priest.
- Then, open your mouth wide and extend smoothly and horizontally your tongue.
- There is no special order, so that nobody should feel compelled to follow a general movement.
- Do not judge your neighbor who abstains from receiving Holy Communion, as there is no obligation to receive it daily. However, "Live in a manner to be able to receive communion every day!" (St. Augustine).

In this Church, the faculty to absolve sins is directly granted to the priests by the Holy Father.

"I urge you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, your spiritual worship." Rm 12:1

DRESS CODE

Out of respect for Our Lord Jesus Christ and for the edification of our neighbor, we beg all to appear in Church decent in deportment and modest in dress.

However, no one has the right to question others, especially visitors. It belongs to the parish priest alone to instruct the laity when they repeatedly dress or deport below expectation.

Gentlemen and lads: Neither shorts, T-shirts nor sneakers meet the norms of modesty.

Ladies and girls: Neither shorts, slacks, sleeveless, short nor low-cut dresses meet the norms of modesty.

Furthermore, according to apostolic custom or Church law, gentlemen are bareheaded in church; and ladies are requested to cover their heads. Thank you for your charity.

CHRIST'S PASSION SERVES US AS AN EXAMPLE

The Passion of Christ is, by itself sufficient, to form us in every virtue. For whoever wishes to live perfectly need do no more than scorn what Christ scorned on the cross and to desire what He there desired. There is no virtue of which, from the Cross, Christ does not give us an example.

If you seek an example of charity, "Greater love than this no man hath, than that a man lay down His life for his friends" (John 15:13), and this Christ did on the Cross. And since it was for us that He gave his life, it should not be burdensome to bear for Him whatever evils come our way. "What shall I render to the Lord, for all the things that He hath rendered to me?" (Ps. 115:12; RSV Ps 116:12).

If you seek an example of patience, in the Cross you find the best of all. Great patience shows itself in two ways: either when a man suffers great evils patiently or when he suffers what he could avoid and forbears to avoid. Now, Christ on the cross suffered great evils. "O all ye that pass by the way, attend and see, if there be any sorrow like to my sorrow" (Lam. 1:12). And He suffered them patiently, for "when He suffered, He threatened not (1 Pet. 2:23) but "led as a sheep to the slaughter," He was "dumb as a lamb before His shearer" (Isa. 53:7).

Also it was in His power to avoid the suffering, and He did not avoid it. "Thinkest thou that I cannot ask my Father, and He will give Me presently more than twelve legions of angels?" (Matt. 26:53). The patience of Christ on the Cross, then, was the greatest patience ever shown. "Let us run by patience to the fight proposed to us: looking on Jesus, the author and finisher of faith, who having joy set before Him, endured the cross, despising the shame" (Heb 12:1-2).

If you seek an example of humility, look at the Crucified. For it is God who wills to be judged and to die at the will of Pontius Pilate. "Thy cause hath been judged as that of the wicked" (Job 36:17). Truly as that of the wicked, for "Let us condemn him to a most shameful death" (Wisd. 2:20). The Lord willed to die for the slave, the life of the angels for man.

If you seek an example of obedience, follow Him who became "obedient unto death" (Phil. 2:8), "for as by the disobedience of one man, many were made sinners; so also by the obedience of one, many shall be made just" (Rom. 5:19).

If you seek an example in the scorning of the things of this world, follow Him who is the King of Kings, and the Lord of Lords, in whom are all the treasures of wisdom. Lo! on the Cross He hangs naked, humiliated, spit upon, beaten, crowned with thorns, sated with gall and vinegar, and dead. "My garments they parted among them; and upon my vesture they cast lots" (Ps. 21:19).

It was error to crave for honors, for He was exposed to blows and to mockery. Error to seek titles and decorations, for "plating a crown of thorns, they put it upon His head, and a reed in His right hand. And bowing the knee before Him, they mocked Him, saying 'Hail, king of the Jews'" (Matt, 27: 29). Error to cling to pleasures and comfort for "they gave me gall for my food, and in my thirst they gave me vinegar to drink" (Ps. 68:22).
